I am inspired to speak about...



Sunday, during the protest, I listened as a mother lamented as she spoke about seeing her 11-year-old, honor roll son in handcuffs in the back of a police car because he refused to stand during the school’s Pledge of Allegiance; and

Two weeks ago, as my younger daughter looked to her mother to help make sense of her world as she spoke about Arbery and now Floyd’s death.

Two weeks ago, I had no immediate words of encouragement, no words of hope, no scripture verse to quiet her fears; however, with a clear head and a careful and prayerful heart, I do now.

So, for you Jessika, Kayla, Joshua and all of our black children...this is for you:

Driving, **jogging**, sleeping, **yelling**, parking, **babysitting**, sitting in a van, **selling CDs**, selling cigarettes, **opening the door**, walking at night, **wearing a hoody**, holding a toy gun, **lying on the ground**, being homeless, **being in a stairway**, holding a cell phone, **having a broken taillight**, exercising horses, **having a bottle of prescription pills**, shopping at Walmart, **holding a bb gun at Walmart**, holding a phone in your own backyard, **eating ice cream in your own house**, shopping – **you matter**. More importantly, you matter to the Almighty and Sovereign God who does not sleep or slumber.

Ultimately, it is my sincere hope that by educating ourselves, our children, and the children we serve, we come to realize that “Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere...[for] whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly.” *Martin Luther King Jr.*
